Children of the Dump (registered as Asian Students Christian Trust) provides education, family support and loving care to deprived children living in extreme poverty on the Payatas Rubbish Dump in Manila. During 2017 – 2018 we had 120 children in our care; supported in different ways; some of whom have been neglected, abused or even abandoned. Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The focus for the charity this year has been the strategy to replace Cashew Tree School and raising the necessary income to open initially in temporary accommodation in 2018 and by 2019 in new purpose-built accommodation.

The site and scope of the new building has been agreed with additional capacity able to be developed to create Independent Living Accommodation for older students as this is the government policy. This will be subject to new funds being identified.

The appeal launched in March 2017 had a positive impact on income for the year but was predominantly one-off donations and sustainable income sources remains our goal.

Services in Manila continue to operate with formal relicensing taking place following regulatory inspection. Mango Tree House is a loving residential home for 47 children aged 4-21 (or until their education is complete). A greater emphasis is placed on re-integration with family if safe to do so and supporting the child to continue their education while resident with their family.

Grapevine supports over 60 children to continue with their education while living with their family. This avoids the need for the children to work on the dumpsite to help the family income.

In the UK, the drive to reduce overheads and costs has continued, resulting in the office accommodation being vacated and diverting the saved funds into other fundraising activities. The strategy for raising income has focused more on applying for grants and on-line fundraising as well as traditional sponsorship and maintaining the excellent child/sponsor communications which are so valued by child and sponsor alike.
